

This type of advertising has created an inferiority complex among darker skinned women as seen in the rising sales of fairness cosmetics. This form of biased advertising has come under harsh criticism. Are we as a society encouraging and supporting 'colorism'?


The desire to be beautiful is natural. What is not natural is determining that only one type of skin colour is beautiful. We need to be inclusive of all skin tones and look at the diversity of beauty. Every skin colour shade is beautiful. Additionally, beauty is only 'skin deep'. We need to stop equating light-coloured skin with beauty because 'black is beautiful' too. 'Beauty is in the eyes of the beholder and therefore is a very subjective matter. Discrimination on the basis of skin shade is therefore not logical. Many such discriminations have been defeated over the past decades. We should stop encouraging ads that promote colorism. Let us not regress but rather progress. Real beauty is the personality and the qualities of a person. The focus should lie on being beautiful from within, rather than obsessing over outer appearance. (140 words)

<u>Argument AGAINST the subject of the statement:</u>

We as a society have always been obsessed with fair skin tone and it is time to put a stop to this. This prejudice has been around for way too long, including in our books, movies and real life. We find a wonderful example in the children's fairy tale 'Snow White', where her mother the wicked queen asks the magic mirror, "Who is the fairest of them all?" and the mirror replies saying that Snow White is the most beautiful, thus stressing on inner beauty rather than outer appearance. Fair skin instills confidence and sets one up for success. Fairer people seem to get better jobs, deals and life partners, so it's natural that people will desire to be fair. If some people want to use beauty products to make their skin lighter they should be allowed to do so without criticism as it is a matter of personal choice. (150 words)

The monthly expenditure of a family is represented in the given pie chart. Food and education make up 30% and 25% respectively of their monthly expenses. The family spends the most on these two areas. Miscellaneous items come next in order of percentage, that is, 20% which comprises of money spent on both essential and luxury goods, such as, clothes, gadgets, vacations, etc. Health care and rent take up 10% each. Transportation takes up the last 5% of their monthly expense. Overall the data shows that the family does maintain a good balance on expenditure. After spending on food, they have spent a significant amount on education. Spending 25% on it shows that the family gives it a lot of importance. About 80% of the total money is spent on liabilities, and the remaining 20% is spent on other items. In conclusion we can say that this family spends its money wisely indeed. (153 words)

relaxed state of mind. In the story, the arrival at Assam sets the tone for the rest of the
story. How Rajvir feels, reacts to things, is excited and overwhelmed, are influenced by
his natural surroundings.

Dust of Snow -

- A crow accidentally sprinkles some snow from the hemlock tree on the poet. The snow immediately changes his mood for the better. He feels happier and starts appreciating nature more because it helps him see life beyond his own insignificant troubles.
- Crows and hemlock trees are both viewed as inauspicious. But the poet is able to show
 them in positive light because his perception has changed. The natural setting of the
 poem makes even a crystal of snow have a big impact on the poet.

Tea from Assam -

- Rajvir is visiting Pranjol's house in Assam during the summer vacation. He has read up about Assam, its weather, scenic beauty and tea gardens. He shares his research work with Pranjol and his father.
- While traveling from the railway station to Pranjol's home, he passes several tea estates.

- The room did not have an attached balcony, as described by Ausable, so when Max stepped out, he was injured since he landed on the hard ground below instead of a balcony.
- The unexpected twist at the end made the story more exciting / unpredictable ending and unpredictable protagonist.

Fowler's changed impression of Ausable -

- Ausable was nothing like the typical spy that Fowler had seen portrayed in the movies and novels.
- The day had been a most ordinary one rather than one full of car chases and gun-slinging criminals.
- Ausable's interaction with Max and how he outwit him really impressed Fowler / realised that first impressions could be wrong / 'Never judge a book by its cover' / first impression should not be the last impression / appearances can be deceptive / Ausable outwit Max with his intelligence by telling a believable story to create a trap.

To summarise - While Fowler was initially disappointed and unimpressed by Ausable, his opinion is most likely to have changed to one of respect and awe after Ausable was able to outwit Max.
