Subject: Backgrounder/Advisory for Promoting Eco-Friendly Celebrations through Eco Clubs for Mission LiFE – reg.

In recent times, Plaster of Paris (POP) artefacts are being used during various events. POP idols are non-biodegradable and insoluble in water. On immersion, they release harmful substances such as gypsum and toxic heavy metals from chemical paints into water bodies. This reduces oxygen levels in water, endangers aquatic life, contaminates drinking water sources, and often causes skin and respiratory health problems in people living nearby.

To address the above issue artefacts made from natural, biodegradable materials which dissolve easily in water and do not cause pollution may be used.

Schools, through their Eco Clubs for Mission LiFE, have an important role to play in spreading awareness on this subject. Discussions, debates, poster- making competitions, community outreach programmes, hands-on workshops, encouraging students to create their own small biodegradable idols and artifacts may be organized in this regard. Such activities would offer opportunities to promote creativity as also environmental awareness, highlighting the adverse effects of POP idols and benefits of eco-friendly alternatives. By linking these activities with Sustainable Development Goals such as Responsible Consumption and Production (SDG 12), Climate Action (SDG 13), and Life Below Water (SDG 14), students can better understand the global relevance of local practices. Promoting eco-friendly celebrations through the suggested activities also offers opportunity to develop key competencies outlined in the National Curriculum Framework (NCF) 2023 across all stages of school education:

- i. Foundational Stage: Activities like crafting simple clay models foster a positive regard for the natural environment (CG-6), building empathy and care for nature from a young
- Preparatory Stage: Discussions and awareness campaigns help students develop ii. sensitivity towards their social and natural environment (CG-4 — The World Around Us). making them conscious of their impact on the world.
- iii. **Middle Stage:** Investigating the life cycle of idols—from resource extraction to disposal allows students to understand the spatial distribution of resources, their conservation, and the interdependence between human activities and natural phenomena (CG-5 — Social Science).






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Furthermore, the hands-on creation of idols directly addresses competencies in Art Education (aesthetic and creative expression), Work Education (learning through practical, productive hands-on work), and fosters vital critical thinking skills.

Schools are advised to deliberate on this issue in Eco Clubs for Mission LiFE meetings and encourage students to take the message of sustainable celebrations to their families and communities. In doing so, students will contribute significantly to the objectives of Mission LiFE by promoting behavioural change towards environmentally responsible lifestyles.
