The arts are a significant medium through which all children and young people can experience the world. It shapes the development of the child through both its cognitive and nurturing capacities. To foster creative ways of thinking and doing, government bodies have an important role to play to support and redefine creativity in schools. With the thematic focus on policy, the first day will focus on the role of government bodies to shape an arts and cultural policy for developing an infrastructure for a robust arts education sector with innovative curricula, and beyond existing colonial models, including the outdated binaries of art versus crafts. By contextualizing the arts to be the core of teaching and learning, the need for structural reforms and implantations within the schools system will be discussed, alongside the need for an integrated arts pedagogy. Case studies and best practices will complement the panels and culminate with thematic workshops on nurturing a vibrant ecosystem for the arts through a collaboration of various stakeholders.

Zones of Exchange: Where Living Traditions and Contemporaneity Meet in Arts Education

Colonialism enacted the art (*masculine*) versus craft (*feminine*) binary in India, relegating the hand-made to the margins of production, exchange and discourse. Institutionalized critiques of this binary emerged in Santiniketan and Baroda in the realm of higher art education in the 1940s and 1950s respectively, and later many artists have addressed this binary in both urban and rural contexts. This panel will contextualize how living traditions can function as the raw material for contemporaneity, and how such contact can be productive for curriculum development in schools in a globalized era.

2.00pm - 2.30 pm :: Paper Presentation Art and the Republican Universe: The Modern School, Delhi, 1947-1961

With the coming of Indian Independence in 1947, there was an earnest quest for a Republican universe. A turn towards art was to provide the premises for such a universe, and there were serious efforts to create a robust art curriculum for the schools in India which it was argued would help children locate themselves in their proper historical and political contexts. The process of citizen-making was thus deeply connected with providing the future citizen these contexts through art. Teaching, however, also required a proper pedagogy. Thus, citizen-making entailed the search for a proper pedagogy. This paper will present these ideas with through a case study of The Modern School, Delhi, envisioning a new historical juncture for creating a dynamic pedagogical regime through art teaching practices.

This paper will historicize this context in its 19th century western romantic ideals and orientalist ethos, moving beyond binaries to formulate integrationist insights for contemporary arts education.

The arts deserve a central place in the curriculum in schools as they are very important for young people to broaden their minds for developing kinaesthetic, visual and rhythmic intelligences. Schools should encourage and celebrate those who want to study art, music, drama or design – and those who wish to study maths and languages, too. There is also a vital need for a child/youth art movement to develop a philosophical soul in our contemporary time that is marred by socio-political turbulence, economic inequalities, resurgence of religious fundamentalism and climate change. With the thematic focus on pedagogy, the second day will focus on sustainable models for art education, ideas for a convergence of museums and schools, and metaphorical thinking to foster artful and experiential modes of teaching and learning.Case studies and best practices will complement the panels and culminate with thematic workshops on practice-based research modules in arts pedagogy.

Disappearing Dialogues is a platform for creative engagement and cultural expression and has been collaboratively working in the East Kolkata Wetlands (EKW) over a period of three years. Through these years, this platform has engaged with various stakeholders in a bid to foreground the immense ecological and environmental contribution the EKW has in sustaining everyday life in Kolkata. The EKW itself is sustained by the collective practices of the peri-urban wetland community who see wastewater as a nutrient, as something to be preserved as it enhanced their livelihood opportunities. At present, developmental and environmental threats render this socio-spatial landscape fragile, susceptible and vulnerable. Through art, performance, installations, workshops, exhibitions and DIY activities, this project engages with the local youth and lot of effort has been made to address the local school curriculum to imagine a lively and vibrant future. The art education system of India exhibits a very peculiar scenario, with the subject existing in the school curricula as an extra-curricular activity. With the continued presence of colonial models of art education, it is important to re-visit examples such as the Santiniketan school and also the Nehruvian ideals for a resurgence of traditional art and culture implicit for the development of the education system in India. This paper will elucidate (with examples) the need for collaborative projects with folk and Adivasi artists within the school curriculum not



only for the psychological development of students, but for sociological improvisation. Collaborative and participatory activities offer the possibility for the formation of the 'folk' within an urban structure, and is very much needed when modern individual identities are

degenerating our society.
